Opporchancity

Each year, the staff at Westmoreland Cleanways takes advantage of its membership in PROP (the Professional Recyclers of Pennsylvania) to attend the annual PROP Conference, a state-wide convention of recycling professionals, both public sector and private sector. We get to meet with colleagues from other counties, municipal recycling coordinators and equipment vendors, to learn the latest in recycling technology, innovative ways to improve recycling programs, and educational outreach. We learn of all the great programs being offered in other parts of the state and around the country and dream of ways to implement them when we get back home. Sometimes, we get to pat ourselves on the back by presenting ideas that are successful here in Westmoreland County that other communities want to emulate.

At this past July's PROP Conference in Erie, a colleague and I attended a session showcasing some innovative municipal recycling programs. A community in New York was one of the first to require their waste hauler to use compressed natural gas (CNG)-powered collection vehicles even though no haulers were equipped to do so at the time. They had no idea how the requirement would be received, but they knew what they wanted for their community, and took the chance to make it happen. Now, six years later, over one million residents are now being served by CNG trash and recycling trucks, resulting in better service, cleaner air, and a healthier environment, all at a significant cost **savings** to their residents.

One Western PA municipality has become a model of forward thinking in developing its waste and recycling program. This community offers full-service curbside single stream recycling, **weekly** curbside yard waste collection, and pay-as-you-throw (PAYT) trash service so you only pay for the trash you throw away. Several years ago, municipal officials there rightly predicted the unprecedented growth of their formerly rural township, and determined then and there that they would manage that growth to best meet the social, economic, and environmental needs of their existing and future residents and businesses.

By clearly identifying that forward vision, the community, 20 years later, reflects a model of economic growth and sustainability unmatched in the state. To quote the community's website: "Planning for the long-term health of the community is the # 1 goal of the ... Plan, and (our)

Township is already well on the way to building a decision-making framework that places the community's long-term health and sustainability at the forefront of every initiative."

I've had the privilege of knowing the township's recycling coordinator for a number of years. Each time we meet, I am further amazed at the innovative recycling projects they continue to implement, from a commercial-grade, solar-powered cardboard compactor installed at a public drop-off site, to the latest proposal to start a curbside food waste collection along with yard waste.

I relate this story, because if you meet this gentleman, you'd never know that he sits at the pinnacle of what we recycling coordinators only dream of. A very humble man, he takes no credit for the program's success. He credits it all to "opporchancity". My colleague and I stole sideways glances at each other, not sure that we heard our friend correctly, but we did. Then again, knowing our colleague, that's exactly how he views his municipality's success. They were willing to seize the **opportunity** and take the **chance**. They had a vision, took a chance that their vision would be shared by residents, seized the opportunity to implement programs, and have been rewarded with a community that people want to live in and businesses want to move to.

It's a lesson to be learned by all of us who have visions of what we'd like our communities to be...places of economic opportunity, quality municipal services, a clean and healthy environment...and who aren't afraid to speak up, become voices for our neighbors, AND pitch in to bring that vision to life.

Adieu Carl and Glenn

With great sadness, we said goodbye this past year to two beloved members of Westmoreland Cleanways' family, Carl Anderson and Glenn Witherspoon.

Carl Anderson passed away in November, 2010. A retired nuclear engineer and avid outdoorsman, Carl was first appointed treasurer of (then) PA CleanWays of Westmoreland County in November of 1997. He remained active as treasurer, working cleanups and collection events through early 2002. His wife, Liz, took over Carl's board duties when he was no longer able to get out and about. Carl had an early and profound impact on my formative years with Westmoreland Cleanways, and I'm sure I speak for other staff and board members who worked along side Carl during those years. I share the following with you, as I did with Liz when I learned of Carl's death:

"Back in the day when I was still pretty new to PA CleanWays, Carl was our Treasurer and used to come into the office once a week to review the books. He and Jack (Driscoll, then-Executive Director) would talk about stuff; being in a small room together, it was pretty hard not to listen in. Carl was questioning the need for additional staff. Jack tried to assure him that he and I were capable of doing our jobs quite efficiently. Carl persisted. While he acknowledged that we were doing a good job, he seemed concerned that while we spent all of our time fulfilling the day-to-day tasks, we wouldn't have time to plan ahead, to see the big picture.

"But when do you have time to dream.....?"

His face was lifted and his arms were spread as if to encompass the world. I remember him saying that like it was yesterday, and have never forgotten it."

I recall Carl's words often when the temptation to get bogged down in minutiae threatens, when the world demands constant motion as a sign of productivity. How right Carl was. If we don't *"have time to dream..."*, to see the world as we want it to be and figure out how to get there, it never will. Carl touched many, many lives. We were just one small part of his, but we are grateful that we shared his world for a brief period of time.

Glenn Witherspoon passed away this past June, 2011. A retired communications engineer, Glenn used his expertise to build and maintain the well-loved Litter IQ boards in use by PA CleanWays chapters and affiliates across the state. Literally THOUSANDS of youngsters, young and old, are still amazed that it takes *"how long??"* for plastic bags to degrade in the environment? Glenn would spend hours re-soldering the circuit boards and wire strands that made the educational boards buzz or light up with the correct answer. Until he became too tired to visit, Glenn continued to engineer new marvels to enhance our displays. One of the last and best gizmos is a frame to stabilize our tabletop display so visitors can concentrate on it's message rather than worry about it collapsing on them. The other was feet for our Litter IQ Board and Recycling Board, so they would stay upright instead of sliding all over the table. Simple marvels that made a profound improvement to our educational programs.

With much love, we wish Carl and Glenn peace in a place far better than ours.

Waste Watchers 2011

If you look to the bottom of the credits on Page 2, you'll notice a new logo representing Westmoreland Cleanways' receipt of the 2011 Waste Watchers Award, presented by the Professional Recyclers of Pennsylvania (PROP). "The **Pennsylvania Waste Watchers** program recognizes recycling, waste reduction, reuse, and composting programs in Pennsylvania that have exhibited exemplary performance. This year, over 120 municipalities, counties, private businesses, individuals, and community organizations from throughout Pennsylvania were recognized for going above and beyond what is mandated under Act 101 for their communities or programs.

Act 101 - the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act -has helped generate significant economic and environmental benefits for over 20 years now. Recycling has become a billion dollar industry in Pennsylvania and with each passing year, there is a steady increase in the amount of collected recyclables and the number of jobs created by the industry. Recycling has saved precious resources and energy, and limited greenhouse emissions as well as other air and water pollutants.

This growth and success is the result of a serious commitment to recycling by individuals, businesses, government, and recycling and organics industry personnel like these award winners."

Westmoreland Cleanways was recognized by the Waste Watchers panel of judges for our extensive public outreach programs to promote recycling and environmental stewardship, our special collections, and our special events recycling program.

Besides Westmoreland Cleanways, other 2011 Westmoreland County Waste Watcher Winners are:

Central Westmoreland Habitat for Humanity ReStore

The Central Westmoreland Habitat for Humanity ReStore is an outlet that accepts donated goods from local retailers, contractors and individuals in our community for resale with a focus on home improvement items such as furniture, home accessories, building materials and appliances. These donated goods are sold to the general public at a fraction of the retail price to help CWHFH fund the construction of new and refurbished homes for selected partner families within our community. In addition, the CWHFH ReStore provides an environmentally and socially responsible way to keep good, reusable materials out of the waste stream in Westmoreland County.

Delmont Lions Club

The Delmont Lions Club, a non-profit service organization, began their recycling program in the fall of 1996 to serve the Borough of Delmont. Delmont, with a population of 2,800, is not required by state law to recycle, so the Lions Club's effort is 100% voluntary. The Club collects glass, plastics, aluminum, bi-metal cans and newspapers on the first Saturday of each month, from 8 a.m. to Noon.

Glass is separated by color and hauled to a glass recycler in Glenshaw; newsprint goes to a local dairy farm to be shredded and used as animal bedding and then eventually spread on fields as compost. The plastic is transported to a local firm that recycles it to manufacture picnic tables and lawn furniture. Plastic and glass are recycled at some expense for the Club. The aluminum and bi-metal is sold to a junk yard, generating some income; proceeds from the sale of metal is shared with local groups that provide volunteer help on different months.

In 2010, the Lions Club recycled: 55,000 pounds of newspaper; 33,960 pounds of mixed glass; 9,460 pounds of bi-metal cans; 3,872 pounds of aluminum; 21,887 pounds of various types of plastic, for a combined total of 57.8 tons of recyclables kept out of the landfill. The Lions Club Recycling Program gives hundreds of area residents access to recycling that they would not otherwise have.

The following local organizations assist the Delmont Lions with their recycling effort: Trinity UC Church, Delmont Area Athletic Association, Delmont Presbyterian Church, Salem Lutheran Church, St John's Catholic Church, Faith United Methodist Church, Girl Scouts, and Boy Scouts (both scouts and parents).

CLEANUP NEWS

Westmoreland Cleanways Joins Forces With Keep America Beautiful

In the Winter 2011 "By The Way" newsletter, we announced that our sister organization, PA CleanWays, Inc., merged with Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful (KPB), the state affiliate of Keep America Beautiful. From the new Keep PA Beautiful's website: "Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful is the result of two organizations with similar missions joining together to achieve a common vision, a clean and beautiful Pennsylvania. In 2010, PA CleanWays (1990) and Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful (2003) merged to become the new Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful whose mission is empowering Pennsylvanians to make our communities clean and beautiful. Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful is the state affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, Inc., the nation's largest volunteer-based community action and education organization."

One of the considerations to be made at the time PA CleanWays and KPB were negotiating their merger was what would become of PA CleanWays affiliates like Westmoreland Cleanways, independent organizations who partnered with PA CleanWays on specific projects while maintaining their unique services and identity. The answer was to retain an affiliate structure whereby organizations like Westmoreland Cleanways could renew an affiliate agreement with KPB and be entitled to program support and funding opportunities that Keep America Beautiful made available through its state affiliate, KPB.

At the same time, Keep America Beautiful (KAB) was seeking to establish stronger ties with other self-sufficient environmental organizations like Westmoreland Cleanways, with established commitment to their communities. From KAB's website: "Keep America Beautiful, Inc. is the nation's largest volunteer-based community action and education organization. With a [network](#) of more than 1,200 affiliate and participating organizations, KAB forms [public-private partnerships](#) and programs that engage individuals to take greater responsibility for improving their community's environment."



Because of Westmoreland Cleanways' strong ties within the Westmoreland County community, our history of environmental stewardship, and our role as Westmoreland County's recycling coordinator, KAB approached Westmoreland Cleanways to become a direct affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, thus according us equal access with all the other affiliates to KAB's vast pool of educational, programming, and funding opportunities. Westmoreland Cleanways recognized the value of an affiliation with KAB, and agreed in principle to join KAB's network.

Part of the certification process required that Westmoreland Cleanways complete a Community Litter Index to serve as a baseline for cleanup needs of our service area. Since the Westmoreland County Illegal Dump Survey was updated in 2009, the Litter Index focused on more urban areas of the county. Nicole, our summer intern, spent the last few months driving the streets of Greensburg, Irwin, Latrobe, Monessen, and Vandergrift searching for trash and litter in those communities. We are very pleased to report that, on KAB's litter index of 1 to 4, with 1 being little to no litter and 4 being heavily littered, our communities averaged 1.3; while some pockets of litter exist, overall, our urban areas are very clean places to live.

With all of the requirements for certification now met, we await final approval of our application from Keep America Beautiful. Once received, we will join Allentown, Harrisburg, Lancaster County, Philadelphia, York, Reading, and Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful as direct affiliates of Keep America Beautiful.

In the meantime, Westmoreland Cleanways has renewed its affiliation agreement with Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful, so we will have access to Keep America Beautiful programs until our official recognition by Keep America Beautiful. In fact, we recently received a grant in the amount of \$1,500 through the Anheuser-Busch/Keep America Beautiful, Inc. Lend-A-Bin Grant Program to purchase 30 additional ClearStream special events recycling bins so we can expand our lending program. *Opporchancity?* We believe that affiliating with Keep America Beautiful will enhance our ability to provide quality recycling, education, and cleanup programs to Westmoreland County. Stay tuned for news of our Keep America Beautiful Certification Celebration.

Yough River Cleanup Phase 2



One of the highlights of last fall's cleanup season was the Yough River Cleanup that was organized with Youghiogheny Canoe Outfitters. If you missed the wrap-up on our website, it's worth repeating ... the cleanup was awesome!. The weather couldn't have been more perfect for a day on the river. Twenty-two volunteers from the Belle Vernon Area Outdoors Club and Boy Scout Troop 230, along with the crew from Youghiogheny Canoe Outfitters, pulled over 100 tires from the river near Turtle Island below Cedar Creek Park. The only thing that stopped the volunteers from getting more tires was that all the canoes got full. Thanks to Youghiogheny Canoe

Outfitters, Veolia ES, the Borough of West Newton, West Newton Giant Eagle, and friends Shawn and Andrea, who provided lunch for everyone, it was about the most fun someone could have picking up trash.

In fact, it was so much fun, and so successful, we decided to do it again this year. The cleanup is scheduled for Sunday, October 9, starting at 9 a.m. Youghiogheny Canoe Outfitters will furnish canoes, but volunteers can bring their own. Volunteers will be transported upriver to the Cedar Creek Park boat launch, where they will begin the trip. Clusters of tires can still be found in pockets along the banks of the river. Volunteers pull the tires out of the riverbed, pile them into their canoes, and continue downstream to West Newton. There, the tires are hauled out of the canoes and dumped into a rolloff provided by Veolia Environmental Services.

Volunteers should bring appropriate water gear (waders, boots) and dress for the weather. Additional rafts and skidoos will be much appreciated to help transport tires down the river. After the cleanup, a hearty lunch will be provided. Youghiogheny Canoe Outfitters has even offered to provide volunteers with a free canoe rental good for a future date. To volunteer for the event, provide equipment, or donate refreshments, call Westmoreland Cleanways' office at 724-836-4129. Here's hoping for good weather and another great cleanup!

International Coastal Cleanup

In keeping with our partnership with Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful, Westmoreland Cleanways will be registering all fall cleanups in Westmoreland County, including the Yough River Cleanup Part 2, as part of the International Coastal Cleanup project. ICC Day itself is September 17; however, any cleanup conducted from the end of August through the end of October can be included.

The International Coastal Cleanup (ICC) was started 25 years ago by the Center for Marine Conservation, now known as the Ocean Conservancy, as a way to monitor the amount of trash being thrown into our oceans and waterways by fishing vessels, cruise ships, and recreational boaters, and trash that found its way into our oceans via upstream waterways. Since all trash eventually finds its way to a waterway, the ICC decided to expand its target areas to include all cleanups, regardless of direct proximity to a waterway. The ICC now includes participants in all 50 states and 90 countries. The primary requirement for participation in an ICC cleanup is to record the types and amounts of trash collected, and report it to The Ocean Conservancy.

As always, Westmoreland Cleanways will provide safety instructions and cleanup supplies for your cleanup. All that is required is a cleanup coordinator who will be responsible for completing data cards (provided) and reporting results. You will need to know the name of the stream or waterway (or watershed, if the cleanup is not actually in the water), miles of shoreline/roadway or size of area cleaned, number of volunteers, and how much trash is collected.

Remember, even your annual road cleanup can qualify for inclusion in the International Coastal Cleanup. Contact our office today to register your event, get your supplies, and join the thousands of volunteers around the world who will be working to keep our waterways clean.
