2007 Volunteer of the Year

It has become a tradition with Westmoreland Cleanways that our Volunteer of the Year is not present at the Appreciation Dinner where his or her contribution to the year's success is showcased. We've come to accept this phenomenon because it gives our staff great pleasure in acknowledging the honoree twice—once at the dinner and once with a special presentation. This year was no exception.

Westmoreland Cleanways is pleased to announce Dave Crouse, from Firestone Building Products Company, as our 2007 Volunteer of the Year.

We first met Dave back in the spring of 2005 when we were planning a large cleanup on Cool Springs Road in Sewickley Township as part of Keep Pennsylvania Beautiful's Great PA Cleanup. The site contained several hundred tires to be disposed, in addition to the rest of the trash littering the steep hillside. As part of the Great PA Cleanup, disposal assistance for trash and tires was offered from the advertised sponsors, one of which was Firestone Tires. You'd think that would have made planning simple...but I was wrong. I began my search for a local Firestone store that would accept the tires we cleaned up for disposal. That trek became more complicated than I anticipated, as the local retail Firestone Tire Store manager didn't know anything about the Great PA Cleanup and, bottom line, couldn't help with the tire disposal. Calls to Keep PA Beautiful headquarters in Harrisburg unfortunately did not yield any results, either.

In the meantime, a crew of volunteers from the USDA Rural Development office spent a lovely spring day rolling 327 tires down the hillside, banking them off of the guardrail across Rt. 136, and stacking them for pickup by Somebody. The Sewickley Township supervisors agreed to haul the tires to their municipal building until we could get a truck there to haul them away, trusting that we would work out the details as usual.

Just about at wit's end, I was driving through Youngwood when I remembered that there was a Firestone facility in the Buncher Industrial Park. With nothing to lose, I gathered my

courage, stopped at the office and asked to speak to somebody who knew something. Next thing I knew, Dave Crouse came through the door. I poured out my tale of woe, he listened patiently, and then disappeared. Great, I thought, my last hope is gone. Just as suddenly, Dave reappeared with the name of a contact at Firestone's Chicago office. After he explained the difference between Firestone Tire Company and Firestone Building Products Company (two entirely different divisions), he told me that if this person couldn't help, to call him back and he would keep trying to find the right person.

Long story short, Dave's Chicago contact was the right person and a Firestone truck was soon on it's way to Sewickley Township, much to the supervisors' delight and our relief.

I left Westmoreland Cleanways for a brief time shortly after that; upon my return, I was going through some records and came across a rather large donation from Firestone Building Products ... unsolicited, I might add.

Then, at the next tire collection, this guy comes to volunteer bearing a few dozen gloves and a cooler full of beverages for the volunteer crew ... Dave again. At the next tire collection, he brought donuts for everyone, always welcome when you're standing in the middle of a parking lot on a chilly Saturday morning. Without being asked, Dave stopped at the office with a box of lovely door prizes for our dinner, I think before we even decided to try a Chinese Auction. Oh, and did I mention the second rather large donation for next year's Fugitive Tire Program From Firestone Building Products Company?

Dave will probably be embarrassed when he reads this, because we know he certainly doesn't think he's doing anything special—just showing his support for our environment and desire to make Westmoreland County the great place we know it is.

Searching for Something Good?

The internet is such a part of our lives it's hard to imagine what we ever did without it. We use it for everything from looking up phone numbers to finding directions to (my favorite) shopping! As an environmentalist and recycler, it's a great tool to use to cut down on unnecessary waste. Reading the newspaper, paying bills on line, using email, and looking up information without having to drive from place to place saves paper, saves fuel, and of course, saves precious time and makes us more productive.

Here's one more reason to use the Internet, or at least one more way to make it more productive. The next time you have to look something up, try www.goodsearch.com and then choose Westmoreland Cleanways as your favorite charity. GoodSearch is a Yahoo-powered search engine, so you won't be giving up any functionality by using it instead of Yahoo or Google. The bonus is, one cent will be contributed to Westmoreland Cleanways each time you do a search. A GoodSearch button can be added right on to your browser toolbar so you won't even have to think about it the next time you do a search. Pretty cool, eh?

For you on-line shoppers, try www.goodshop.com, GoodSearch's companion site. Apparently, only certain retailers are participating right now, but they include all the big boys like Target, Best Buy, Wal-Mart, Macy's, Overstock.com, Pet Smart, and hundreds more. Each retailer has agreed to donate a percentage of the purchase price (anywhere from 3% to 37%) to the charity of your choice.

The shopping process and prices are no different than if you purchase directly through the retailer's website. Each charity listed on either GoodSearch or GoodShop must verify that it is a legitimate non-profit, legally registered charity, so you can be confident your donation will be going for its intended purpose.

Funding for the program comes from advertising revenue and commissions generated by the search engines. Thousands of worthwhile charitable organizations (including Westmoreland Cleanways) can benefit greatly by simply making a small adjustment to a task we perform dozens of times a week anyway.

Trash Talk

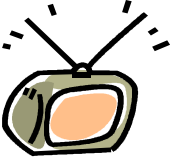
You never know where things will lead when you walk out the door in the morning. Back in July, Jennifer Jackowitz invited me to speak at a press conference for this year's Westmoreland Fair to announce Westmoreland Cleanways' partnership with the Fair Board to recycle beverage containers using our ClearStream recyclers. Westmoreland Cleanways' recycling program was featured on WTAE several times that week, and lots of fairgoers took advantage of the new recycling program.

At the press conference, I had the opportunity to meet representatives from other media groups, including Ashley Kessler from 1480 WCNS Radio in Latrobe. Ashley was so taken with the many ways Westmoreland Cleanways serves our community that she pitched the idea of doing a monthly radio show on 1480 WCNS' Saturday morning "Talk Block", a weekly talk show featuring a variety of speakers with news of interest to their Westmoreland County listeners.

Our board and I jumped at the opportunity to spread the word about Westmoreland Cleanways and the exciting work that our volunteers and sponsors do for the community; thus, Trash Talk was born. Trash Talk will air the first Saturday of each month as the 8:30 a.m. segment of Talk Block. Each show will cover a different program offered through Westmoreland Cleanways, geared toward events coming up at that particular season. We're thrilled to have this new venue to sing the praises of our volunteers and thank Ashley and WCNS for the opportunity. TV-Cycling

As we enter 2008, those of us dinosaurs who still have analog TV sets and rabbit ears will soon be faced with the daunting task of having to replace our old sets with new digital signal-ready sets. FCC rules mandating the change take effect on February 17, 2009. In addition to the bite in our pocketbooks from having to replace our old sets, what to do with them is the huge question looming over recyclers, including Westmoreland Cleanways, as we speak. Industry experts predict that one in four households will have to dispose of or recycle at least one television in the next two years. Here in Westmoreland County, as in cities and towns across the country, we have the makings of a "perfect storm", too much waste and not enough infrastructure, either recycling or waste disposal, to deal with it all.

From an environmental viewpoint, millions of pounds of toxic waste contained in the TV sets would pollute the landfills, waste such as arsenic, beryllium, cadmium, hexavalent chromium, lead, and mercury.

Westmoreland Cleanways is currently in discussions with industry partners to come up with a workable solution to the TV disposal problems. Issues to be addressed include location of a collection site, permanent or movable, who will take the stuff, and how much will it cost? Cost will be as important as all the other factors - disposal of this magnitude will definitely come with a price tag. Stay tuned for updates in the coming months. Rest assured that whatever program is developed, Westmoreland Cleanways will ensure the best program with the best value for our residents.

I Can Recycle What, Where?

I finally got tired of looking at the stack of used computer disks, empty ink cartridges and batteries in my office and packed them all off to be recycled. Maybe you have a similar pile in your corner. Here's a quick reminder that you can drop off any of that stuff at our Westmoreland Cleanways office at the GreenForge Building on Donohoe Road.

We take all old computer and recording media (floppy disks, CDs, video and audio cassettes, 8-tracks); we take batteries (alkaline, general purpose, rechargeable, small lead-acid); we take cell phones and peripherals (cords, chargers, holders); and, we take ink jet printer cartridges. We'll even take small electronics and small propane tanks.

For larger items, or if Donohoe Road isn't on your beaten path, check out the Recycling Guide on our website at www.westmorelandcleanways.org for other convenient recycling options. The next time you're out and about, stop by our office during regular business hours to say hello and let us recycle it for you.

Paper Recycling Update

Speaking of dropping off your recyclables, we now have our own Paper Retriever recycling bin in the GreenForge Building parking lot. It is open to the public, just like the other 140 paper recycling bins in Westmoreland Cleanways' network. Feel free to drop off your newspapers, magazines/catalogs, office paper and junk mail any time. You can collect your papers in plastic grocery bags and throw bag and all into the bin. Paper doesn't have to be sorted, we accept the glossy inserts, and staples and paperclips don't have to be removed.

Did you ever wonder why you can't put telephone books or chipboard in the paper recycling bins any more? It all has to do with what the paper is being used for. Abitibi-Bowater purchased Westmoreland Cleanways' collection program from Recycle Management Corporation in 2005 when they were looking for new sources of recyclable paper. Abitibi is one of the world's largest manufacturers of newsprint and one of the largest users of recycled paper. Since Abitibi uses the paper itself, it

cannot collect paper it can't use in its own manufacturing process. Telephone books and chipboard are already made from recycled paper, paper which has been recycled beyond its useful life for Abitibi's requirements.

Another question you might have had is why you can put plastic bags in the recycling bin. Plastic grocery bags are by far the most convenient way to store your paper, transport it, and get it into the recycling bin. We and Abitibi both agree that whatever makes it easy for people to recycle is worth the effort.

Abitibi empties each recycling bin and trucks the paper to a processing facility in Carnegie that is operated by Recycle Management Corporation, Westmoreland Cleanways' original partners in the paper recycling program. Once the paper gets to the processing facility, it is sorted both by hand and mechanically until it meets Abitibi's strict quality standards before being shipped to Abitibi's paper mill. Any plastic or paper

bags, twine, corrugated cardboard, or other contaminant such as telephone books or chipboard are removed during this sorting process. Recycle Management Corporation must then dispose of any "contaminants" that can't be recycled or that they don't have a market for.

This process shows that no matter what our intentions, material can only be considered truly "recycled" if it can make it through the processor and be shipped to a manufacturer. Unfortunately, putting material that can't be recycled into a recycling bin just prolongs the inevitable disposal of the material.
