Single Stream Recycling Program To Be Suspended

It is with deep regret that Greenstar-Pittsburgh informed Westmoreland Cleanways that the Single Stream Recycling Program will be suspended as of January 31 due to the catastrophic downturn of the economy and recycling markets across the world. We are, to say the least, heartbroken.

We were first notified of the drastic developments in early November, and have been working diligently with Greenstar and others, pursuing all avenues and possibilities to keep the program going, hoping to be able to hold on until economic conditions improve. Unfortunately, current predictions are that markets will not change in the foreseeable future, 18 to 24 months at least.

This situation has nothing to do with the success of the program. It has grown beyond all expectations, experiencing a 29% increase in material collected in December alone! It also has nothing to do with the credibility of Greenstar or Waste Management. They are the best in the industry and we greatly respect the support they give to Westmoreland Cleanways.



This has everything to do with the global economic crisis reaching our doorsteps. You only have to read the papers to realize what's happening: Alcoa shutting down plants (aluminum); US Steel cutting back (metals); Consol Energy closing mines (energy); retail stores closing (cardboard), the auto industry in peril. If anything, this speaks to the success of recycling - that all of the material being collected goes directly to the remanufacture of new goods. When

demand for those goods stopped, so did the need for recyclable material - that hard and that fast.

Westmoreland Cleanways is privileged to serve Westmoreland County. This is an excellent program that proved that recycling can and does work. We view this as a temporary setback that will certainly not deter us from trying it again when market conditions improve.

In the meantime, we will work to find other alternatives and options to recycling. Waste reduction will be a key - now would be a good time to re-examine your purchasing habits to identify ways to eliminate waste. If you don't get it in the first place, you won't worry about how to recycle it.

We will continue to conduct events for hard-to-dispose items (tires, batteries, freon appliances, scrap metal, electronics, TVs, HHW), and have some other new initiatives planned as well. Of course, there are always litter cleanups and illegal dump cleanup projects. Environmental stewardship doesn't end with recycling.

Take inspiration from articles in this newsletter to find other ways to reduce consumption, conserve energy, protect our waterways from pollution, and clean up our community.

Recycling—Alternative Locations

Many recycling options will still be available to Westmoreland County residents and businesses; the kinds of material that can be recycled will be limited.

270,000 residents living in mandated municipalities will still have access to curbside recycling. *Curbside recycling programs* are required by PA law. Residents should recycle plastics, aluminum and metal cans, and/or glass, depending on what is collected in their municipality.

Businesses within mandated municipalities are required by law and municipal ordinance to recycle. Waste haulers can provide recycling service along with refuse disposal.

Westmoreland Cleanways staff is available to perform a waste audit, a useful tool to identify specific waste streams and offer suggestions for waste reduction, reuse or elimination.

- ◇ Latrobe Transfer Station: #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum and bimetal cans, clear/green/brown glass; Corrugated Cardboard. Hours 7 a.m.—2 p.m. M-F; 7 a.m.—Noon Saturdays 724-537-8974
- ◇ Greenridge Reclamation Landfill: #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum and bimetal cans, clear/green/brown glass; corrugated cardboard, newsprint (B&W) 724-887-9444
- ◇ Roadway Plaza, Seward: #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum and bimetal cans, clear/green/brown glass; newsprint (B&W) 24 Hr. Access
- ◇ Salandro Refuse, Inc., off Rt. 119 in Crabtree: Corrugated cardboard. Fee may apply. Call 724-668-2020 for details.
- ◇ Valley Landfill: #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum and bimetal cans, clear/green/brown glass Hours 5:30 a.m.—4 p.m. M-F 724-744-4000
- ◇ Westmoreland Waste Landfill: #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum and bimetal cans, clear/green/brown glass. Hours 7 a.m. - 3 p.m. M-F; 7 a.m.—11 a.m. Saturday

Options for fiber (cardboard, newspaper, office paper, telephone books, and other types of paper) are much more limited. Some animal shelters and farmers may still want newsprint for animal bedding. Please call our office if you need a source of paper or would like to be included on our referral list.

Abitibi Paper Retrievers are located in several locations throughout the county. They accept newsprint, magazines/catalogs, office paper and junk mail. Check out the bin locator at www.paperretriever.com for a bin near you.



2008 Appreciation Dinner Highlights a Year of Success

Volunteers from across the county came together on Friday, December 5, for an evening of celebration to honor all those who contributed to a banner year of programming and new initiatives sponsored by Westmoreland Cleanways in 2008. Special guests in attendance included cleanup volunteers, programming partners, members, and contributors.

A highlight of the evening was a presentation by guest speaker Ward Dingmann, Vice President of Operations for Levin Furniture, who shared with the audience some of the unique and innovative waste reduction, recycling and energy saving strategies that earned the company a 2008 Waste Watcher Award.

Backyard Compost Workshops—Last Chance to Get A Free Bin!

Backyard composting—the ideal way to properly manage your organic waste, improve the health of your soil, get your exercise, and enjoy the outdoors all at the same time—and it's absolutely free!

Numerous studies have concluded that up to 25% of waste going to our landfills is organic material that otherwise could be composted. That same percentage holds true for waste generated in our homes. Kitchen scraps and yard waste (leaves, grass clippings, brush trimmings) can easily be put in a pile in the corner of your yard, where, with minimal effort, it will break down into compost that can be worked into your garden soil or lawn, providing numerous benefits. The volume of material decreases by two-thirds or more. Collectively, this equals literally acres of landfill space in Westmoreland County alone.

Westmoreland Cleanways, along with Penn State Master Gardeners, conduct Backyard Composting Workshops annually to teach the art of composting to both novices and seasoned veterans alike. For the last 9 years, we've had the good fortune to be able to offer free backyard composting bins to class participants. These Earth Machines, manufactured by Norseman Plastics from recycled #2 plastic, were provided by the PA Department of Environmental Protection and Penn State Department of Crop & Soil Science. Over 1,000 workshop participants received a free Earth Machine so they could put their new knowledge to good use.

We were notified that 2009 will be the last year for the compost bin distribution program. The Earth Machine bins, which retail for approximately \$85, will be given to each workshop participant until our supply is gone. With 9 workshops to choose from, we should have enough of a supply so that everyone who attends a workshop this year can receive a bin.

It's important to remember, though, that while the free compost bin is nice, it certainly is not a tool necessary for successful composting. Workshop participants will learn the fundamentals of composting, what makes it rot, techniques on how to build a compost pile and how to manage it, troubleshooting, AND how to make your own compost bins for free or using inexpensive materials. Old pallets, wire fencing, and concrete block make great compost bins.

Pre-registration is required to attend a compost workshop, and there is a \$5 per person material charge, payable at the door. Following is a list of scheduled classes. We recommend that you register as soon as possible, as class size is limited and the classes fill quickly.

2009 Fugitive Tire Program

As another cleanup season rolls around, it will soon be time to prepare for the Fugitive Tire Program, an educational program where youth groups are recruited to scour the countryside for illegally dumped tires, collect them, and turn them in to a participating tire dealer for proper disposal. The Fugitive Tire Program is absolutely one of Westmoreland Cleanways' most popular programs. Groups that started collecting tires in 1995 still call every year to register for the event. Thousands of young people have seen first-hand the environmental damage caused by illegally dumping tires, and were able to do something positive for their community and the environment by cleaning them up. Those thousands of young people collected over 48,200 tires in 13 years. That equates to 1,687 tons of rubber, or enough tires to outfit 12,050 cars, which would fill Westmoreland Mall's parking lot twice. And you thought it was hard to get a parking space at Christmas time!

Sometimes we think there can't possibly be more tires out there. While there are some back roads that continually get dumped (possibly because the dumper knows the tires will get picked up) the majority of tires are at old dump sites. According to rough statistics reported so far in the 2009 Illegal Dump Survey, another 3,000 have been spotted.

The Fugitive Tire Program runs each Saturday during the Earth Month of April. Any youth group is invited to participate: boy or girl scouts, church youth group, or school club. Participating groups must choose one Saturday in which to go out, collect the tires, and return them to a participating tire dealer by Noon of the same day. Tires must be collected from the wild; they cannot have been stored on someone's property or collected ahead of time. The group must deliver the tires to a tire dealer assigned to them, who will be prepared to receive the tires on the chosen day. Young people are encouraged to discuss the reasons the tires were dumped where they were rather than being properly disposed, to take before- and after- photos, and must complete a questionnaire about their experience. In return, the youth group earns a bounty of \$.75 per tire for each tire up to the first 200 collected. The bounty can be used for whatever special purpose the group has. It often is used to fund another service project in the community, making the Fugitive Tire Program a truly win-win situation for everyone.

We also have 2 collections scheduled for the Westmoreland Fairgrounds, although the fall date may be changed. Always be sure to check your quarterly newsletter, the website, or call the office to confirm the date of a scheduled event.

Westmoreland Cleanways welcomes back the following vendors for this year's events:

- ◇ Tires—Dan's Tire from Dickerson Run, Fayette County. Dan Roadman and his crew give Westmoreland Cleanways hours of their time every year, recapping tires that can be salvaged and delivering the rest to Liberty Tire's Braddock PA facility where they are ground and marketed for various applications. They also recycle the vehicle/lead acid batteries.
- ◇ Freon Appliances-The Appliance Warehouse on Pittsburgh's South Side collects old freon appliances, removes the freon, refurbishes the unit if possible, and recycles the metal if it's beyond repair; check out www.appliancewarehouse.com for all of their services from sales to installation to parts.
- ◇ Electronics-eLoop LLC specializes in cost effective, secure and environmentally responsible disposal of outdated electronic equipment.
- ◇ Scrap Metal-Salandro's Refuse, Inc. collects scrap metal, alkaline batteries, and propane tanks.
- ◇ Miscellaneous: Westmoreland Cleanways staff will take compact fluorescent lights (CFLs), old Christmas lights, rechargeable batteries, cell phones, videotapes, CD/DVDs, floppy disks and ink cartridges.

We will continue to add items to be collected as we find more outlets and resources for proper disposal (see Holiday Lights Disposal Tip opposite).

How many sets of non-working Christmas lights do you have? Here's a great way to get rid of them. Check out HolidayLEDs.com Christmas Light Recycling Program. If you ship your old lights to them, they will break them down into recyclable components, and send you a 15% discount coupon for any product on their website.

Of course, the idea is to promote the more vibrant, brighter, cooler LED lights which use 80% less energy than traditional incandescent bulbs and can last for over 50,000 hours (their claim, not ours).

If you don't want to bother shipping them yourself, drop them off at one of our collections or at the office—we'll find a use for that 15% discount!
